

Pledge Update and reminder

Our monthly repayment schedule on our loan for our exterior restoration is \$577.66. Our goal is to have at least this amount pledged for each month. ELCA Disaster Response March 2012

Deadly storms raced across the Midwest and the South recently, spawning at least 64 violent tornadoes that killed more than 50 people and injured many more in 14 states. Hundreds of homes, farms and businesses were damaged or destroyed during the outbreak.

A <u>Stewardship</u> Minute

Written by S. William Snover, MD Financial Secretary "Now we have received, not the spirit of the world, but the Spirit who is God, so that we might know the things that have been freely given to us by God". (1 Corinthians 2:12)

Too often we count our blessings in terms of tangible *things* such as our homes, our possessions, and our money. But, aren't these things only of this world? As the adage goes, "we can't take it with us". When we are asked to give, don't we immediately think of tangible *things* and then have to decide if we can "afford it"?

In Paul's letter, we are reminded that God's gifts to us are not necessarily tangible (worldly). God's gifts of health, talent, love, happiness, time and the ability to have faith even when times are tough cannot be weighed or measured, yet these are the spiritual things for which we should be truly grateful. These are given to us "freely", with no strings attached and no expectation of future repayment except that we honor God by using His gifts wisely. Since the dawn of human existence, we have been compelled to show gratitude for God's gifts, and God has no problem with this. We love each other, we reach out, we show compassion, we use our time and talents to glorify God through ministry, we pray, we look upward for guidance and help, and we are grateful.

For most of us, the church is a very essential focus of our spiritual nature. This is where we come together as a family in Christ to serve Him. While our purpose is spiritual, we exist in a tangible world. Our gifts to the church, both spiritual and tangible, allow the church to go forward in fulfilling God's mission to show "our faith, hope and love through prayer, discipleship, ministry and worship".

Are you faithful in your stewardship through your gifts of time, talent, ability and treasure? Belong, don't just observe.

ONLINE BANKING

A simple way to give...

If you already use online banking through your bank, you can easily set up "Bill Pay" to automatically send (or whenever you decide to send it) your tithe to the church.

You simply go into your "Bill Pay", put in the address of the church and your envelope number where it asks for your account number. It will ask what account (checking or savings) to use and put in the amount you want to send. You can set it to send automatically at a certain time each month or you can go in manually and tell it to send your tithe whenever you want to send it. That is it! Very simple!

When you tithe in your church envelopes, you are giving the 10% or whatever you can afford to give to support the general budget that you voted on and approved at the November congregational meeting.

The Synod depends on our church's tithe to support their budget for general operating expenses that was voted on at last year's Synod Assembly. We have an obligation to the synod to support that budget.

ELCMA ASSEMBLY



Pray daily!

(W)holy, (W)holy, (W)holy Health Healing and Wholeness

"For in hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what is seen? But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience." (Romans 8:24-25)

We are in the midst of the season of hope. Easter lasts a total of 50 days, ending with Pentecost, and the birth of the church. In celebration, we are surrounded by symbols of hope – colorful eggs, pictures of baby animals, greenery, rain, rainbows, and flowers – signs of re-birth and a promise of life after death.

If we look at the Easter story as recorded by Mark, this promise of life after death was not inherent in the minds of Christ's followers. On the morning of the resurrection, three days after Christ's crucifixion, two women named Mary arrive at the tomb with the ingredients to anoint the body of their teacher and friend. Instead of a body, they see a young man who tells them that Jesus is not there. Hope was not their first reaction! Instead, they are both so frightened that they run back to the village, and tell no one about their experience. They were not alone. Two men did not recognize their traveling companion on the road to Emmaus. Others gathered in a room in town, petrified of what

would become of them now that their leader had been killed. Then of course, there was Thomas, who refused to believe until he had physical proof. In all cases, these people had to grow into their understanding of hope beyond their limited sight.

Today we have come to understand that hope must be something we cultivate in each other, and that without it, we will not have a fruitful life. It's been said that man can live for about 40 days without food, about 3 days without water, about 8 minutes without air. However, he cannot live more than a few seconds without hope. Psychologist Erick Erikson stated, "Hope is both the earliest and the most indispensable virtue inherent in the state of being alive ... if life is to be sustained, hope must remain, even where confidence is wounded, trust impaired." Closely related to the experience of trust is the capacity to form effective attachments to others, including God. Viktor Frankl, in his book Man's Search for Meaning, noted that prisoners who lost their faith were doomed to die in a short period of time, echoing Proverbs 13:12, where "Hope deferred makes the heart sick."

So how do we cultivate hope? It begins in early childhood, through ongoing loving interactions with responsive care givers. The secure base of the relationship serves as a safe haven to which a child can return for comfort, support, and guidance when he/she becomes fearful during interactions with the world. In time, this safety becomes internalized through the belief that someone will be available – providing hope, and an understanding of being loved.

Can't we say the same of our relationship with our Lord?

There are spiritual, physical, and mental health advantages to increased hope. It aids in coping with adversity and leads to improved life satisfaction. Hopeful people tend to make healthier lifestyle choices. Studies have proven that they recover from illness and injury more effectively, and have increased life expectancies. They manifest less depression and anxiety and experience increased positive mental health and personal adjustment. They persevere when barriers arise, and are more effective problem solvers. In addition, they hold positive views of relationships and are open to receive social support. According to psychologist Martin Seligman, one of the most significant findings in psychology in the last twenty years is that individuals can choose the way they think.

How can one develop a hopeful attitude? With time and practice, a new habit of hopeful thinking can take shape. Here are a few tips from the experts at the Mayo Clinic:

- Check your inner voice periodically throughout the day. If your thoughts are mainly negative, try to replace them with positive ones.
- Try not to take yourself too seriously. There are plenty of humorous situations in everyday events even in difficult times.
- Exercise at least three days a week. Exercise releases endorphins in the body that help to positively affect mood and reduce stress.
- Surround yourself with positive, supportive, dependable people who give helpful advice and feedback.

Negative people tend to deplete hopeful energy from others.

• Pray, and be gentle with yourself. Some days will be more difficult than others, but get into the habit of not saying anything to yourself that you would not say to someone else. As the Rev. Billy Graham was reported to have said, "I've read the last page of the Bible. It's all going to turn out all right." *Easter's hope filled blessings to* all!
