Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ;

We are coming to the end of another church year, and beginning a new church year together, the year C from the Lectionary. In this new church year we will read predominately from the Gospel of Luke with additions from the Gospel of John.

But first, there is this month of November. We begin with the celebration of All Saints' Sunday, and end with Christ the King Sunday and the First Sunday of Advent. In between, we have the great American feast of Thanksgiving.

When I think of Thanksgiving, I think of trees holding on to those final few brown dried up leaves, making silhouettes on the early sunsets, sentinels guarding the gathering darkness on the horizon. I think too of the growing cold and warm cozy kitchens, brisk winds and a sense of closure to the autumn season, and, waiting for the arrival of winter. Trust, hope, faith, are key for November as one settles in, knowing there will be more darkness than daylight, knowing that the darkness will continue to increase before the days lengthen again.

These feelings surround me and nudge me into thinking about the ways God provides for us in this growing darkness. Just as the world was in darkness before the birth of Jesus, God provided prophets, signs, to show the way, and to guard the faithful in their watching and waiting. God still provides comfort, guidance, and peace to those whose trust is in Christ. How does God speak to you on these late days of days Autumn?

We know also that in the darkness of the encroaching November and Winter, God is nourishing roots, bulbs, tiny seeds buried in the ground, and that in this rest in the darkness, they are not dead but alive. We know that at times when we feel the darkness densely around us spiritually, that God is preparing us, nurturing us, giving us rest, for the 'Spring' that will follow.

Pine Street Lutheran Church is being nourished by God's life, as we travel together, spiritual partners, reaching out to the world from the strength that is within us. Even in this 'Interim' time, this church is not dormant, it is not in darkness waiting, but is alive in Christ, hearing and doing the Gospel message, not closed down because of a change of season.

As your Pastor, I encourage you to rejoice in the changing seasons of our place in the Northern Hemisphere, and I encourage you to continue to blossom and grow with God's agenda in your life, in your Church.

"All the believers were one in heart and mind. No one claimed that any of his possessions was his own, but they shared everything they had. ...There were no needy persons among them."

This passage begins at Acts 4:32. The tale ends at Acts 5:11. Monthly Financial Stewardship report through 8-31-2015

In 2015 we need to *average* **\$2,445** per week in giving to assure that we are able to meet all of our budgeted expenses. Our expense budget is something that we adopted and <u>committed</u> to.

Our weekly average church attendance in September was 58. Our total giving to the General Fund totaled \$7,739, an average of **\$1,935** per week.

Our year to date attendance was 2743 (70/week) and our year to date total giving was \$88225, (\$2,262/ week.) We ended the month \$7,130 behind in the giving that we will need to meet our budgeted expenses. Can each of us commit to being even more faithful in our attendance and support? If you cannot attend as regularly as you'd like, please consider making regular contributions through the automatic *Simply Giving* program. Many of our members have stated that they have been "thinking about" making the commitment. Now is the time to "get around to it" and join those who have taken the step. All Saints' Day

We are inheritors of what generations of Christians before us passed on to us; we are temporary caretakers of today's churches. But though they are gone, those who "died in the Lord' live very much in his care. The traditional terms for the deceased saints is the "Church Triumphant," while the believers who are alive today "Church are called the Militant." All Saints' Dav celebrates the connection between the Church Triumphant and the Church Militant, the saints of the Lord Jesus on earth and those in heaven.

Since the earliest Christian martyrs (such as St. Stephen in Acts 6-7), the Church has remembered the saints who have gone on before. By the third century some 400,000 faithful had been martyred under Roman persecution. Each city and country commemorated dates the when its particular martyrs entered glory. In the ninth century the hundreds of saints days for local martyrs gave way to a single All Saints' Day on November 1st. The day was popular throughout verv Europe in the Middle Ages. Today the Christian Church's All Saints' Day competes with our secular Halloween (which originated in All Hallows' Eve,

Still, to experience All Saints' Day as a walk among the saints on earth and in heaven is to sense our place in history. We are members of a chosen people, defended and preserved by our Lord, facing the world of today and awaiting our final redemption with the saints in heaven.
