A Note From Pastor Lois



Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

This is the second article with a focus of one idea of the Reformation, this month, The Holy Bible. We look to October 31, 2017 as the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation. We think of all the major changes that occurred as a result of that Reformation and can hardly encompass the vast differences because of that event, and likewise, we can hardly begin to think of all the changes in the world in those 500 years.

When I think of the time of the Reformation, I think first of the Holy Scriptures. Very few people outside the learned scholars in the Church and academia were able to read the Holy Bible. Latin was the language used in the churches, Latin, Greek and Hebrew testaments were used in universities and seminaries.

"He (Martin Luther) was convinced that Christians and theologians should not only adhere to Scripture but live and remain in it." When I think of the risk to his life in the years following 1517 that he endured to bring sacred scripture, The Holy Bible, into the hands of the people, I am humbled. In 1522, he was kidnapped by his friends and taken to the Wartburg Castle for his own safety. The bounty on his head meant that he could be shot by anyone with no questions asked. For his protection, he was given a small room in a tower in the Castle, none of the few staff in the unused castle knew his identity.

After complaining of isolation and boredom, his friends brought his books and he began to translate the New Testament into the language of the people, German. He used original sources of the Greek. When he returned to his work at the University in Wittenberg the New Testament was quickly printed. Because of the invention of the printing press, these translations flew off the shelves of book stores. People were so eager to read for themselves the Word of God, presses could not keep up with demand.

OFFICE S HOURS: 8AM -NOON In 1534, Luther and his colleagues finished the translation of the Old Testament. Now the people could read the truth of scriptures, study them in their homes, teach them to their children, and hear them read in their own languages in the Churches. In later centuries, to have a Bible in homes of Christians seems like a common ordinary thing that most Church members would have, but in the 16th century, it was not common, it became a mark of freedom.

I am wondering what Christians of the 21st century have done with this freedom? Is the Word of God from Sacred Texts, The Holy Bible, still revered? Are Bibles still read, daily, weekly? Do we still live in it, and remain in it? So much was risked and so much gained to give us the truth, has it become old, passé, do people no longer care about the truth of God?



Looking forward to visiting again that room in the Wartburg Castle in Eisenach, where Luther translated word by word the sacred Word of God, I pray that Christians everywhere might be stirred by the Anniversary of the Reformation, be renewed in their honor and trust of Sacred Scripture, and read daily from our Holy Bible. Many of our revered hymns are taken from sacred scripture. Psalms are meant to be sung. In Lutheran Churches, the norm on Sundays is to read four texts: Selections from The Old Testament, The Psalms, The Letters of the New Testament, and The Holy Gospels.

I pray we will continue to treasure the Word of God, and continue to be formed and shaped, freed and renewed by God's Word.

Preparing for Back to School

It is hard to believe that back to school is right around the corner. Before you know it, the kids will be heading out the door for school and you'll be asking yourself where the summer went. If you have a child who is just starting kindergarten, middle school, or high school there may be a lot of "new transitions" this year. Maybe this year is old hat for your kid and, therefore, it will be easy going. Either way, starting school can still bring anxiety for some kids-even when they are excited to head back and see all their friends and teachers.

Children take their cue from their parents. If you are calm, reassuring, optimistic and supportive, children will feel both confident and competent. In many cases, children will experience some separation anxiety and so will parents. Therefore, it is important for parents to take the lead and parent not burdening their children with their own anxieties. Be honest with your children: talk to them about their fears, and listen with empathy. Children will tell you more when you open yourself up and listen to them without judgement. If attending a new school, try to visit your child's school in advance. Let your child get familiar with classrooms, hallways and important offices such as the principal and the nurse. Some of the local schools have open houses before school starts:

Liberty Valley-August 23rd from 4PM-6PM;

Middle School August 23rd from 5PM-7PM;

<u>DPS</u> - August 24th from 4PM-7:30(time depending on the grade)

<u>High School Freshman Orientation</u> – August 8th 6:30PM.

Remember, going back to school can be an exciting time for many. In the excitement of back to school shopping and preparations, try not to loose sight of some of the anxiety and fears that can sometimes also accompany back to school!

- Let your child know what his schedule will be like. Tell him what time school begins and ends each day.
- Ask your child about her feelings -- both the excitement and the concerns -- about starting school.
- Point out the positive aspects of starting school. It will be fun and she can make new friends.
- Let your child know that all kids are nervous about the first day of school.
- Leave a note in your child's lunchbox that will remind him you're thinking of him while he's at school.
- Reassure your child that if any problems arise at school, you will be there to help resolve them.
- Try to have your child meet a classmate before the first day of school so she will already have a friend when school starts.
- Arrange for your child to walk to school or ride together on the bus with another kid in the neighborhood.







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
